1. How would you like to introduce yourself and do tell us about your current position?

<u>Ans.</u> I am Commander S Venkatesh Kumar. I am an alumnus of the TCE 2005batch from the CSE department. I am a Naval Aviator and a Flying Instructor. I joined Indian Naval Academy on 11 July 2005 after completing my graduation from TCE. I was commissioned into the Indian Navy on 01 January 2007 after initial training. I have nearly 2,500 hrs of military flying experience. In my military career spanning over 18 years, I have served onboard various frontline warships and air squadrons of the Indian Navy. I also served as Military Advisor to the United Nations on behalf of the Government of India and was deputed to Somalia for two years. Currently, I am serving as Second-in-Command of a frontline warship of the Indian Navy.

2. What encouraged you to walk on your professional path? What has been the journey like?

Ans. Every individual is different and it is important to identify one's own strengths and weaknesses. Very few are blessed to end up in their dream profession and I am one of the lucky few. I always had a deep commitment to contribute in nationbuilding as well as a passion to fly. As a military pilot, I am glad that I can play a part in fulfilling both. I was fortunate to get the right guidance from the Padma Shri Dr. R Vasudevan who shaped my thinking enormously and enabled me to listen to my inner calling.
